

Business Retention Coronavirus Disaster Recovery Checklist March 17, 2020

• <u>Check your insurance policy</u>. Look for "Civil Authority" and "Business Interruption" coverages. Civil Authority coverage - civil authority clause, also known as a public authority clause, is an insurance policy provision that outlines how the loss of business income coverage (BIC) applies when a government entity denies access to the insured property.

Business Interruption coverage - Business interruption insurance is insurance coverage that replaces income lost in the event that business is halted for some reason. This type of insurance also covers operating expenses, a move to a temporary location if necessary, payroll, taxes, and loan payments.

- Fill out the "Estimated Disaster Economic Injury Worksheet. This form is not required, but is a
 convenience in clarifying the supporting documentation the state is required to submit to the
 U.S. Small Business Administration when requesting an Economic Injury Disaster Loan
 Declaration.
- Activate your Business Continuity Plan. Make sure your "critical contact" information is up to date. This is contact information for employees, supplier's lists, account numbers, utilities information, landlord and/or mortgage and bank accounts.
- Make a list of immediate deadlines. Rent, payroll, gas, water, electric and supplier accounts. Contact all of these entities and discuss options brought on by the disaster.
- Keep it moving during the downtime.
 - 1. Call clients and/or customers. Send emails notifying all of those that have signed up with your business. Inform them of your specific business plan during the disaster.
 - 2. Reschedule future clients and provide them with the anticipated schedule of events and/or projections of operations.
 - 3. Temporarily eliminate non-critical functions and expenses. Halt un-necessary deliveries and accounts.
 - 4. Be creative. Think outside the box to stay involved. Online marketing and social media campaigns are key. Offer discounts, rewards and updates. Partner with like minded businesses.
- Make contact with available resources and start the process for assistance.
